President's Message

After some much needed rain and unusually cold temperatures (for us, not for most of the country), I think we are all happy that spring is upon us. Despite some showers during the January and February sales, we had lots of customers and sold many, many books, CDs, DVDs, games and puzzles.

In January the special High Value sale was very

successful.. The total income for the January sale was \$22,000, almost \$4,000 of which came from that special sale.

In February we brought in \$17,000, almost as much as the \$18,000 from the 'regular' part of the sale in January. Thanks to Nigel Jones and Nancy Cohen for putting a great deal of time and effort

into making the High Value on-site sales possible. They are already planning another High Value sale for July.

The on-going High Value part of our operation, which involves selling books on-line and at the Pacific Book Auction typically earns us about \$4,000 a month, but in January brought in over \$14,000, (including our on-site sale). It has become one of the most important and profitable aspects of FOPAL's operation, thanks to the fourteen dedicated volunteers on the High Value team who spend countless hours looking up book values, pricing books and finding the best way to sell each item.

During my first year as FOPAL's board president I have

enjoyed working with wonderful, dedicated volunteers and FOPAL's supporters in the community.

Technology Committee Report

As technology continues to evolve, many of the hardware and software systems that FOPAL uses have become harder to maintain and are limited in their ability to address current and future needs. Efforts to implement technology upgrades have been hampered by limited documentation and a dearth of volunteers with the appropriate skills. To address these issues, a new Technology Committee was recently formed to provide oversight in identifying and resolving technology-dependent problems and issues.

The top priorities of this committee are to document existing processes that rely on technology, evaluate web apps that could make FOPAL's operations more efficient, and assemble a corps of volunteers who can take on regular or one-time tasks such as updating the web site, maintaining email lists, evaluating new software, inventorying equipment, and/or creating Google forms for various purposes. A Year on eBay

What was I thinking in February 2022 when I listed History of the 89th Division, U. S. A.: From Its Organization in 1917, Through Its Operations in the World War, the Occupation of Germany and until Demobilization in 1919? Why did I think this book would sell? Who would buy it?

How surprised was I to see that the book sold in a few weeks? What really made it worthwhile was receiving an email from the buyer explaining that his grandfather had been part of this division and how much this book meant to him.

That's when it clicked: as much fun as it may be working as a cashier at the monthly sales where members of our community enjoy buying books at Cubberley, there are millions of people who go on eBay and are willing to pay large sums for rare books.

Just as with sorting books, the variety of these high value books is extraordinary, and provides an opportunity to learn about a multitude of subjects. The high value medical books end up on my shelf and I enjoy listing the tech ones, but for me the real thrill is in the photography and art books. The biggest challenge is to not buy some of these books myself.

My highest value sale was for Medical Jurisprudence, Forensic Medicine And Toxicology, Vol 1 - 4 1894 - 1896, which sold for \$275, but the most "rewarding" sales were the times I sold and hand delivered books to people in our community.

How many times a day (or an hour) do I check the high value gmail account? More than I'd like to admit (and yes, I do get notifications, but I'm not a very patient person). Part of having this shared email is that even if my book hasn't sold, I can share the excitement when someone else's book has.

And then last, but not least, is the help and community from the high value team whether it's about a specific item, or needing to have a book mailed when I'm out of town. As with FOPAL overall, it's all about the people.

The Children's Room, housed in a large portable at the south end of the Cubberley campus, is where to go for books, games, puzzles, and toys for kids from infants through teens. Everything at our monthly sales is a terrific bargain, priced from 50 cents to a few dollars—and mostly in like-new condition!

Do you have a tireless reader in your family? Someone who wants to read an entire series, or who is fascinated by graphic novels? Bring them to our sales on the second weekend of each month. Our room is full of books that will keep them busy and happy. And we love it when students who are avid readers decide to volunteer at our sales. They are invaluable at helping customers find the books they are looking for, and at recommending new titles. Keep us in mind as a great way for students to give back to their community.

Every week our crew of a dozen volunteers sort through, clean, price, and shelve about 100 boxes of children's books, from board books to teen fantasy and sci-fi, from math workbooks to graphic novels, from picture books to dictionaries, thesauruses, and Star Wars character

encyclopedias. We have books in English, of course, but also in a multitude of European and Asian languages. (*Harry Potter* in Japanese, anyone?) We have shelves and shelves of beautiful picture books that you can wrap up and give as gifts, they're in such pristine condition. Books on religion or parenting

concerns? We have them. Awardwinning school-age novels? We have hundreds. Science kits, math flash cards, crafts materials, American Girl books? The Children's Room has them, too. We also sell DVDs and CDs, books on CD, jigsaw puzzles (all with pieces counted so you know you're getting a complete one), and toys. Even the occasional kid-size stepstool or riding horse, depending on donations.

It's almost miraculous that every month we reorganize our room after the recent sale, send to the Bargain Room any books that haven't sold in four months, and process the thousands of newly donated books that come in every

week. By the time the next sale rolls around, we've transformed the Children's Room into a well-organized, attractive bookstore, with prices that can't be beat!

Library News

FIVE-STAR LIBRARY

Palo Alto City Library was recently recognized by the Library Journal's Index of Public Library Service, as a 5-star library, the highest possible recognition and an elevation from last year's 4-star rating.

Ratings are based on per capita library use for materials circulation, visits to the library, event attendance, and use of public computers and WIFI. The 2022 scores and ratings are based on FY2020 data from the Institute of Museum and Library Services Public Library Survey of libraries. The Library is one of 13 California libraries to receive a star rating, and one of only 5 libraries to receive a 5-star rating.

The library was recognized by the City Council on Monday, February 13. The recognition was attended by many staff, Teen Advisory Board members and FOPAL Board members.

LIBRARY ADDS MORE HOURS

The Library recently made yet another major push towards restoring hours lost during the pandemic budget cuts. In February the Children's, College Terrace, and Downtown branches added an additional service day each. Children's is now open Tuesday through Thursday, plus Saturday. College Terrace and Downtown are now both open Wednesday through Saturday. Also, in late January, the Rinconada Library added Sunday hours (10am to 6pm). The Library is looking to open the Mitchell Park Library on Sundays sometime in late spring or early summer. The Library is actively rebuilding from the loss of staff due to the budget cuts of 2020 and hopes to continue to increase staffing to support expanding hours.

LIBRARY EXPANDS CALIFORNIA STATE PARKS PASS PROGRAM

Just in time for spring blooms and wildflower season, the Library now has more than 70 passes available to visit our California state parks for free! In response to high community demand, the Library recently secured many more passes, now allowing for little to no wait time for customers who want passes so they can explore the wide variety of California state

parks. Customers can keep passes for up to two weeks. Passes can be reserved online and are also typically available same day and in-person at any of our five branches.

EVENTS HIGHLIGHT:

SUMMER READING PROGRAM:

Sponsored by FOPAL, the library's 2022 "All Together Now!" Summer Reading Program was our first "read for a cause" initiative, and we had 1665 signups with 777 completions. We donated \$1 to for every participant who completed the program to the Palo Alto Community Fund. This Summer Reading Program was also our big step into bringing back inperson events, and we had a total of 146 events (46 of them were virtual) and an attendance of 6180.

LUNAR NEW YEAR:

(1/28/23): Over 500 attendees came out for the Library's first in-person LNY event since February 2020. We had several performers (including an opera singer, kids' dance group and the TaeKwon Tigers) and crafts for attendees to enjoy.

NEW EVENTS AND PROGRAMS:

- Musicians in Residence Series: Local HS jazz band, Nathan's Fearless Five! are playing every 4th Saturday of the month at Rinconada Library.
- Palo Alto Reads: This year's community reads series will feature events around the book All That We Can Save: Truth, Courage, and Solutions for the Climate Crisis. Events will include a virtual author talk with one of the book's essayists, and two resource fairs during the month of April.
- Community Threads: The Library received a CA state grant to purchase sewing machines in order to provide workshops for teens and adults through June 2023.
- Norooz New Year Celebration: On March 11, the Library hosted its first in-person Persian New Year Celebration at the Art Center. This event included traditional dance performances by the Shadan Dance Group, Norooz Musical Performance by Mo Ebrahimi and a storytime and crafts for children.

The Main Room saw some section manager changes as well as some changes to a few section locations. The Children's Room had a mini-makeover, opening up space to offer more books to their customers. The Bargain Room was a busy as ever, especially with the not-to-be-missed Free Book Giveaways on Monday evening after the sale.

With an emphasis on growing our E-commerce operation, we enlisted more volunteers to work on FOPAL's eBay book listings.

We held monthly all-volunteer zoom meetings as a way to keep the volunteers connected and informed.

We held two FOPAL social events, one with a presentation by Steve Staiger, the Palo Alto Historical Society historian. We also attended the Palo Alto Library's appreciation lunch, given to thank all the library and FOPAL volunteers.

And FOPAL sponsored a Cubberley Community Center Free Library envisioned and created by a FOPAL student volunteer for his Eagle Scout Project.

All this was accomplished while FOPAL processed about 40,000 books each month and generated over \$15,000 per month in sales.

As we start 2023, we are encouraged by the commitment of the FOPAL volunteers, members, and customers. Through our ever-popular monthly book sales, through our financial donations to the Palo Alto Public Library, and through our book recycling program, FOPAL continues to make an impact in our community. FOPAL Library Bookstores

In November 2014, there was excitement in Palo Alto as the new Mitchell Park Library was finally going to open after many delays. FOPAL was particularly happy as we had been given a space for a long desired bookstore. There was a sales kiosk in the Downtown Library but sales were minimal given the small selection.

Some people were skeptical that a large store could be successful. They wondered why people would buy books when they could just get them on loan. However, opening sales at MP went so well that in 2015 another kiosk store was opened at the Rinconada Library. Now we have three venues where people can purchase our merchandise.

The Downtown, Mitchell Park, and Rinconada Library stores each stock what we have found best matches the varied interests of our shoppers. We also often have unusual books. Our FOPAL Section Managers select the books, CD's, DVD's and puzzles. We request that the items they send are in excellent condition. Prices are \$2 for softcover books, DVD's and CD's. Hardcover books are \$3 unless priced otherwise. We also sell \$1 items (primarily children's books) and puzzles and cards are priced as marked. Sales are based on the honor system.

When we initially opened, payment was "cash only" but now customers have the option of paying with cash or PayPal.

The stores receive a delivery of new books no less than once a week. Our volunteers shelve new books as soon as possible and they regularly cull the shelves so that no book is on a shelf for more than two months. The volunteers are always happy to answer questions and assist you if you happen to be in a store during one of their shifts.

We get lots of feedback from our customers with remarks such as: "I just love this store, I always find something to buy." If you haven't visited one of the stores we think you'll be pleased when you do. Perhaps you will leave with a purchase for yourself or as a gift.
